## HFNC Excursion to the Gar Waterfalls track, Troopers Creek, on 24 July 2022

Most of us departed from the Hamilton Visitor Centre at 9.30 am for the long drive in convoy to the Troopers Ck camping ground where we met up with Cathryn, Reto, Yvonne and Steve. As some of the party were intending to walk through to the Beehive Falls carpark, a car-shuffle was arranged so that there would be a vehicle there to return them to Troopers Creek at the end of the walk. While the car-shuffle was being arranged the rest of the party enjoyed a morning tea around a camp fire.

Once all were back together at Troopers Ck, Ross and Cathryn led us on the Gar Falls Track that followed the Dead Bullock Creek. The Gar Falls track led us past a number of small waterfalls and great views of the large sandstone cliffs on the opposite side of the creek. We made our lunch spot with a good view to the very long but narrow Gar Waterfall. In a good wet season the width of these falls would be quite remarkable. The sandstone rocks at all the falls were worn very smooth by the water over many years and looked stunning in their variety of colours from creams and yellows to rich copper.

Along the track to the falls a few birds were seen. At this time there were few plants in flower. Some of the early spring flowers seen along the way were Variable Prickly Grevillea, Cat's Claw Grevillea, Scented Sundew, Guinea Flowers, Brush Heath, Dagger Hakea, Pine Heath, Common Heath, various Wattles (including many feral *A. longifolia*), Common Correa, Hairy Correa and two orchids (Large Mosquito Orchid and the Dwarf Greenhood). Some of the Eucalypts were also sporting white flowers. Although not in flower, the Grampians Trigger-plants were vibrantly green.

Fungi were emerging from the soil and others arising from dead timber: Puffball, Fairy Stool, Jelly Bells, Rooting Shank and the Yellow Belly Buttons.

We stopped for lunch at the Gar Falls near the sign pointing to Beehive Falls and Briggs Bluff further ahead. This is where we spotted a number of Large Mosquito Orchids beside the track. After lunch Ross, Cathryn, Reto, Yvonne, Doug and Pam continued to the Beehive Falls and carpark, while Rod, Steve, Janeen, Glenys and I returned along the same track to the Troopers Ck carpark.

Ross described the walk to the Beehive Falls as a slow and winding walk up to a higher level that left the tall trees behind and followed the track through low stunted growth with views across 50 m to tall grey rock walls that looked much like elephant's skin. Further along there was some bush-bashing and then a steep climb down to the base of the Beehive Falls. Overall, Ross described this section of the track as a moderate walk on the new section of the Peaks Trail with care needed on some sections of the old track. The last 1.4 km to the Beehive Falls carpark was an easy relatively flat walk.
