
COMMITTEE TOPPLED AFTER HARD-FOUGHT CONTEST:

In addition, we have created a new committee position, Publicity Officer: Yvonne Ingeme, who will be liaising with the "Spectator" (and "The Age", "Time", "Paris Match", "Pravda") about interesting events, forthcoming speakers, trips etc. Glenys Cayley, who has been doing a sterling job as secretary and newsletter producer for the last two years, will be having a well-earned respite from the committee.

MEETING: 19th March

The first Special Meeting of the year will be on 19 March. Craig Reid will speak on "The Return of the Shadow". Craig is a Grampians National Park Ranger and is involved with monitoring the endangered Brush-Tailed Rock Wallaby in the Victoria Range. On Saturday 21 March we will have an excursion to learn about hair-tube trapping for the tiger quoll, in conjunction with the Friends of the Grampians. The site is the airstrip on Syphon Road in the Victoria Valley, commencing at 11 am. People travelling from Hamilton can meet at the Tourist Office at 9 am. There will be an opportunity for walking in the area as well as learning about the hair-tube trapping.

LAKE LINLITHGOW

Our first excursion for the year was as usual a morning trip to Lake Linlithgow to count birds. It is interesting to see the variation from year to year; this year there were few ducks but large numbers of swans and also several pelicans. The ducks seen were mostly Australian shelduck ("mountain ducks"). No doubt the birds find it interesting to watch the variation in the Field Nats that turn up from year to year; the Rod-Bird is almost always present, but the others are less predictable. This year there was even a migratory individual from Japan. After the count, some of us went to inspect the roadside site (Forest Lane) where spoil was dumped a year ago on an area of native grassland. After representations from our club, and inspection of the site by Shire representatives, the spoil has been moved. The area has been scraped smooth, so that with luck most seeds of weed species will have been removed, and it is hoped that the native species will recolonise from the adjacent land. Full marks to the Shire for being willing to discuss the matter and rectify a mistake.
