This newsletter is to update you on our program for the second half of the year, including our end-of-year Christmas party, and to let you know about a couple of developments. One of these is the need to...

...ADOPT A CONSTITUTION AT THE OCTOBER GENERAL MEETING

The Club has existed without a constitution for 52 years, but times change and we decided that in order to have standing we need to adopt a formal constitution. This will be drawn up at a Committee Meeting on 23rd September, and then presented at the General Meeting on October 7th, at HIRL, for all members to vote on. "Artist's impression" not with-standing, we hope that it will be as short and simple as possible. HAMILTON REGION NATURE GUIDE

BIRD TALKS ON FRIDAYS

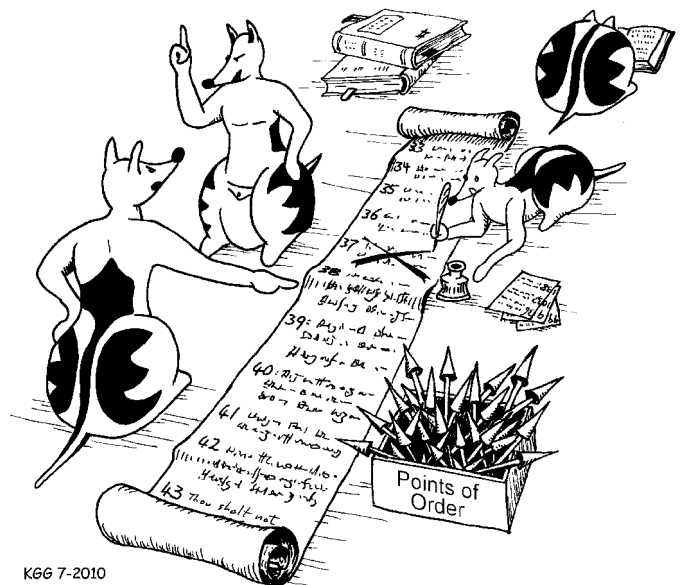
The remaining two Special Meetings for this year will feature birds of islands and woodlands – and **both will be on Fridays**. The September meeting will not be on Thursday as listed in the Program, but on **Friday 3rd September**. At this meeting, **Adam Bester** will speak about, "**Birds of Lord Howe, Chatham, Codfish and Cabbage Tree Islands**." These will include birds of sea and shore and others such as the Lord Howe Island Woodhen and the kakapo. Unfortunately several of our members will be away for this meeting, so please come if you can and make sure you spread the news to any birdos of your acquaintance.

The reason for the change of date of the September meeting is avoid a clash with the Wimmera Biodiversity Seminar, to be held at the Laharum Hall on Thursday 2nd September. This should be an interesting forum with like-minded people. Members who wish to attend should contact the Wimmera Catchment Management Authority.

In November, **Professor Andrew Bennett's** talk on "**Studies and status of woodland birds**" will include data about declining bird numbers. As shown in the program, this meeting also will be on a **Friday (5 November)** rather than on the Thursday. Again, this is one to let your birding friends know about.

CHRISTMAS BREAKUP

This year we have decided to separate the AGM from the End-of-Year/Christmas celebration so there will be no official proceedings to put a damper on things. The **AGM plus General Meeting** will be on **Thursday 2nd**

December, as shown in the Program, and the **Party** will be the following **Thursday, 9th December**. After several years of going west, this year we'll go east and have our picnic and barbecue on the top of **Mount Rouse**, in the picnic area there, starting at **6 pm**. Everyone is welcome; just BYO everything, including food to barbecue if you wish (unless it's a total fire-ban day.)

EXCURSIONS AND WORKING BEES

There has (as yet!) been no change to the planned excursions. This means they should all take place as shown on the program, but it's always an idea to check details with a committee member if you haven't been to the preceding meeting. (If you have lost your program, contact Janeen on 5573 4503 and she may be able to give you a new one.)

Also as shown on the program will be two **Working Bees**. One of these will be a weekend of camping and weed-control at **Fulham Streamside Reserve**, on **17 to 19 September**. The Club has been going there for several years, in an attempt to control sparaxis, gladioli and Cape tulip in this area of diverse grassy/heathy woodland. This year several of the "regulars" will be away, so new people will be especially welcome. People who can't spare the whole weekend or don't wish to camp are welcome to come for either Saturday or Sunday.

Rod Bird is the organiser, and he expects to be there from after lunch on Friday (17th). He says, "Those who can come will find us (or a message at the camp) by the river, after entering the park from Edgewood Road and driving directly down that track to the Fulham Pool. We will certainly be at or near the camp from 8-9 am, 1-2 pm and after 5 pm." Most of the weed control this year will be by wick-wiping rather than spraying, but if the weather is too showery we will just do some botanising and bird observing.

Following this, on **Sunday 17 October** there will be a working bee to try to remove the South African Weed Orchid which is invading the **Nigretta Flora Reserve**. This will run from 10 am to 2 pm. Again, please contact Rod Bird for details.

They scrambled under Natural Bridge (though one stayed out again).

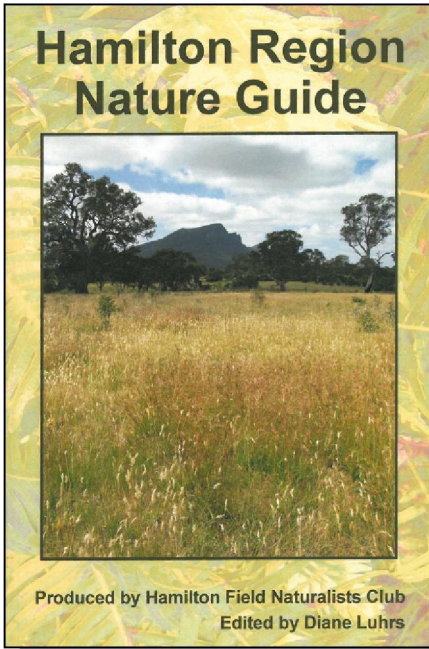
Ten determined bandicoots then took off in a force
